BIG FAMILIES...BIGGER HEARTS



The seeds of being a Man for Others are planted early and often at St. John's Jesuit—and they have been for decades. Parents of teenagers may not immediately see the results of that concept; it might take a while for the idea to take hold and come to fruition. But SJJ alums constantly prove that being a Man for Others—in both small ways and in extraordinary situations—is part of who they are from the deepest core of their soul.

Two Toledo-area alums are showing their commitment to loving others by welcoming children in need into their families.

John '85 and Maria Kreuz, Swanton, OH

John and Maria Kreuz love children—clearly. They are the parents to 14 biological children and three adopted children, as well as grandparents to six. Two of their daughters have also adopted children, so the belief in reaching out to embrace children in need runs deep.

Kreuz, Vice President, Business Banking, at Huntington Bank, has been married to Maria since 1988. Their biological children are Emily, Mary, William, Margaret, John IV, Zachary, Silas, Liberty, Samuel, Aidan, Peter, Sophia, Faith, and Ben-ranging in age from 28 to eight. When Ben was four, the family learned of the great need to foster children whose birth parents were dealing with issues such as opioid addiction. Once they had completed the process of becoming foster parents through Lucas County Family Services in 2015, they brought home two-day-old Juliette. One month later, they added four-day-old Jackson to the family. Shortly after, the Kreuzes found that Jackson had an older sister in another foster home, so they included her in their family home a few months later.

Through taking foster parent classes, the Kreuzes learned that it is beneficial to consider adoption if foster children cannot be reunited with their birth parents or placed permanently in a home. While they were not actively looking to adopt, their hearts were open to the possibility. When it was deemed impossible for Juliette, Jackson, and Elizabeth to be reunited with their birth parents, the Kreuz family adopted them in 2016.

Around the same time, John and Maria's two oldest daughters, Emily and Mary, also began the process of becoming foster parents. Both were single at the time, but Emily was married by the time she adopted Evelyn and Andrew in 2017. She and her husband, Jonathan, are also parents to Caleb, who is three months old. Mary became a single mom when she adopted Josiah, 2, in June 2017.

The adoption journey has not been all rosy, of course. Foster care can be a roller coaster of emotion and uncertainty. After picking up Juliette and Jack from the hospital, Kreuz said, "it seemed 99 percent certain that the path for them was adoption into our family." However, a short time later, relatives surfaced who made claims on the babies. He said, "We felt as bonded to these children as our birth children. In some ways, we felt a fiercer bond because the children were so vulnerable, and we felt the bond was threatened by the uncontrolled circumstances surrounding the relationship." He said it was heartwrenching to know they might lose the babies. But the Kreuzes' strong faith helped them persevere. "Stepping out of the boat to walk on the crazy water of fostering-to-adopt challenged us more than anything we had yet faced. People have to be willing to have their heart ripped out in order for these foster babies and children to have stability, hope, and love. We desperately wanted these children to be our forever kids."

Other obstacles to overcome were fetal alcohol syndrome in one of the babies, as well as anxiety resulting from being in foster care for many years. "It's not easy, but it's worth it. Every day is a discovery."

At the other end of the spectrum is the joy. Kreuz said, "The unexpected fierceness of the bond between ourselves and these non-biological children is amazing. It's an overwhelming love and connection that is unexplainable, but so real and powerful. After having 14 birth kids, it's easy to understand bonding to a newborn. The surprise is that this same connection is very natural and every bit as strong with our adopted kids."

The bond did not just apply to John and Maria and their adopted kids; it was among the siblings, too. "Our teenage son Sam is able to comfort Jackson when he is having difficulty coping with life. Juliette can't go to bed without her older sisters Sophia and Faith giving her a kiss good night. Faith would cry every time Elizabeth had to go home before she came to live with us permanently."

In looking back at the decision to foster and adopt, Kreuz credits SJJ with laying the foundation of being a *Man for Others*. "When the focus shifts from caring for our own lives to caring for someone else's life or changing someone else's future or destiny, then being a *Man for Others* is a reality. Jesus said it best: 'There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends.' Being a foster or adoptive parent is not about me, but about someone else. It wasn't about adding to my family, but rather adding to the life of kids in need."

Doug '87 and Michelle Koop, Sylvania, OH

Doug and Michelle Koop are owners of Koop Family Physical Therapy and parents to four active children: Kaeli, 17; Connor, 15; Kelsie, 11; and Karlee, 8.

In 2014, the Koops knew they were being called to be foster parents. "We felt that God was really urging us to start the required foster parenting classes. We prayed about fostering and started classes in January 2016. The process is very meticulous, including undergoing background checks, fingerprinting, medical exams, home study, fire inspection, and a thorough interview process for everyone living in our home. We were officially licensed on December 9, 2016. We accepted our first baby one hour after we were licensed."

Like the Kreuzes, the Koops found foster parenting to have its challenges—and many rewards.

"We have found that time management was the biggest obstacle to overcome. Foster care involves not only caring for the child, but also doctor visits, weekly parental visits, case worker visits, and learning how the ever-changing foster care system works. As a foster parent, we have the choice of having a relationship with the child's parents or not. We have chosen to get to know the families on a personal level, which can be difficult. The hardest part of foster care is saying goodbye. We really struggle with parting ways, but we try to remember that the hurt is just proof that we loved the child with our whole heart," Koop said.

"The treasured moments include getting to love and care for a child who needs a temporary safe and secure home. Our children have learned about the incredible gift of unconditional love," he added.

Also like Kreuz, Koop felt that the concept of giving back to others was definitely part of his education at St. John's. "SJJ prepared me to serve others through volunteering and missions, including working at St. Ann's and St. Mary's with Father Pipp as a mentor. The *Men for Others* motto was ingrained in me at SJJ."

While both graduates fondly recall fun times and special teachers from their days at St. John's, it's clearly the Jesuit value of service to others that has taken hold in their lives. And, as they continue to give to children in need through adoption and fostering, John Kreuz and Doug Koop are living their lives as examples of St. John's graduates—and Men for Others—for so many to witness.

STRONG FAMILY TIES BIND THE PERINO FAMILY TO SJJ

The Perino clan just may be responsible for one of the most extensive family trees ever at St. John's Jesuit.

Richard and Donna Perino of Maumee, Ohio, are the parents of three sons, two of whom are SJJ

grads (Randy '86 and Ryan '90). Randy was a soccer player at SJJ; he attended John Carroll University and owns his own business. Ryan was a football player and also played college football. He is in pharmaceutical sales. But the fun really began when the next generation of Perinos—eight grandsons who are close in age—entered the halls of St. John's.



- Jacob '15 is a junior at Ohio State University; he is a pre-med major who is currently studying to take his MCAT for medical school. While at SJJ, he was on the swim team (and won several awards); he also played football and earned his Eagle Scout badge.
- Joel '17 was a swimmer and water polo player. He attends Bowling Green State University, where he is majoring in Aviation.
- Tyler '18 plays football, basketball, and baseball. After graduation, he is considering attending Ohio University, but is looking at other options for playing college baseball.
- · Ethan '19 is a Titan baseball player.
- Justin '20 plays football and baseball. This year, he was also on the swim team.
- Brady '20 was the first grandson to attend the Academy. At St. John's, he plays JV basketball.
- Carson '23 plays hockey—not yet for St. John's, as he is in eighth grade, but he will be a Titan icer in the future.
- Max '24 also plans to play hockey for the Titans, as well as baseball, when he enters high school.

Clearly, Richard and Donna spend a lot of time at Lyden Field, in the chapel, and under the Titan Dome. They are strong supporters of Titan athletic teams and the academic foundation at SJJ. When their own sons were looking at high schools, the Perinos were impressed that so many SJJ graduates were teachers and administrators at the school. Donna said, "If a guy thinks that much of the school he attended that he wants to come back to work there, that says a lot about the place." Some of her sons' teachers included Mike Savona '75 and former principal Tim Malone '69; now her grandsons learn from Malone's sons Garrett '04 and Brendan '01, and they see Mr. Savona leading the entire SJJ community. "SJJ couldn't have a better man in the role of president," Donna said.

One key message that the Perinos reinforced with their sons—and now instill in their grandsons—is to always be *Men for Others*. They realize that the difference between St. John's and other schools is the environment of respect and the feeling of community. The importance of brotherhood is always present.

In addition, Donna said, "St. John's has really groomed our grandsons for college, and we see that preparation already as they step out into the world after graduation."

"I only wish every young man could be a Titan," she added.

As the Perino grandsons grow up in the next few years, one can only wonder how many thirdgeneration Titans will take St. John's by storm.

The SJJ Community Steps Up for the Perinos

On July 30, 2017, Richard and Donna's eldest son, Rick, passed away suddenly at the age of 52. Rick and his wife Bridget are the parents of Jacob, Joel, and Justin. Donna said, "We can't say enough about the St. John's families and the outpouring of love that surrounded us in those first few days and weeks—and still does to this day. So many of the staff members we knew—and some we didn't know—came to the funeral, and Fr. Doyle participated in Rick's funeral Mass. To see so many familiar faces of those who love you and your family at such a sad time in your life...we will never forget it. We saw SJJ's motto *Men for Others* in action, and we witnessed the way the community treats others through good times and bad. We are proud to be Titans. "

LABRE PROGRAM Continues to Feed the Hungry in Toledo



A Jesuit education develops a faith that takes action. In this spirit, Labre is a homeless outreach program that was established at St. Ignatius High School in Cleveland and has spread to Walsh Jesuit High School in Akron, John Carroll University and Case Western University in Cleveland, and Loyola University in Chicago. In the Toledo area, St. John's Jesuit and St. Ursula Academy began the Labre program six years ago and are committed to continuing it indefinitely. Every Monday, with the help and dedication of many faculty members and parent volunteers, students prepare a meal, pray for those being served, and deliver this food to the most needy in the Toledo area. When SJJ and SUA began the program, they hoped that many other local organizations would join, and that wish has come to fruition. Lourdes University observed the SJJ and SUA Labre program three years ago and has been sending a team to feed the hungry every Wednesday since then. The Islamic Center of Greater Toledo has also joined in; its members have been serving meals one Saturday a month for the last six months.

Labre occurs even in inclement weather or on holidays. More than 285 trips have been made as of March 31, 2018. So far, SJJ and SUA students have served far more than 10,000 people. More than 600 SJJ students have participated, along with 150 faculty and staff members and others in the SJJ community.

The group begins each experience by preparing a simple meal of soup and sandwiches; they also deliver casseroles made by the SJJ Moms' Circle or another school organization, such as an athletic team. The group conducts a short prayer service, then heads out in a St. John's van to various stops in the Old South End and the east side of Toledo. When the students arrive, they open the van doors and begin serving and building community with those who have come to meet them. The purpose of the program is not so much to feed the poor and marginalized in their community, but really to build relationships with those who are so often forgotten. By breaking bread and sharing a meal, the students form a connection that will continue week after week. These relationships are carried on by keeping track of all those the team has met by writing down their names and stories in scribe books.

Recently, student Labre volunteers noticed that one large family was in a desperate living situation. So, in conjunction with UT Community Cares and the Historic South Initiative, these students are now raising funds and helping to rehab a home for this family to get them into a safe and permanent housing situation.

Labre has been a meaningful opportunity for students, faculty, staff, parents, and alums to experience the plight of the marginalized in the Toledo community and to engage with them in the most basic of human activities—sharing a meal. As the students eat dinner with the meal recipients, they remember Christ's call to care for the needs of the least of God's children.



Community Cares

Approximately two years ago, the University of Toledo Community Cares organization joined the Labre trips. Medical students, pharmacy students, social workers, and doctors—under the direction of Dr. Richard Paat '78—have joined SJJ at its Labre stops in the Old South End and on the east side to provide medical care. Many of the medical students serving are SJJ alums.



"TIES FOR TITANS" PROGRAM Welcomes Incoming Freshmen

When Alan Ruffin '20 was a brand-new freshman in the fall of 2016, he already had the wisdom to reflect on his short time in the high school and his experiences as an Academy student—and he decided he wanted to give back to his community for all he had received. After "a lot of thinking," he said, he came up with the idea of giving ties to freshmen because he felt the ties "best represent what this school is all about."

According to Sue Matuszak from SJJ's Office of Student Life, Ruffin shared with her the fact that he had few ties to choose from when he came to St. John's because he had never really needed them before entering SJJ. "He thought, 'what if someone else out there is in the same situation as I am; how would he feel?' He also wanted to create a welcoming gesture to all incoming freshman students," Matuszak said.

Ruffin's next step was to get a few adults on board, so—with the backing of Matuszak, Mrs. Mary Ann Barabino from the 20/20 Program, and his mom—he started collecting ties to start the project.

He began by asking shop owners in his grandmother's neighborhood for donations. They were generous, of course, and gave him a great start for the collection. Then others heard about the project and began donating more ties. Very soon, Ties for Titans, as the project had been named, had 220 ties ready to present to new freshmen as a symbol of the first step on their SJJ journey.

Now, at the beginning of each school year, freshmen Titans are encouraged to select a tie from the collection. Some students might need the ties to supplement their wardrobe, but others receive ties simply as a welcome to the school.

"It was important to Alan that, when each new freshman received his tie, he shook the freshman's hand. He is a very humble and remarkable young man. The Ties for Titans program is Alan's way of saying welcome to SJJ—and welcome them he did," Matuszak said.

Ties for Titans is the result of Ruffin's understanding of what being a *Man for Others* means and will be his legacy to future freshmen Titans for years to come.

SERVICE TRIPS GIVE STUDENTS THE CHANCE TO SERVE WORLDWIDE



In the summer of 2017, St. John's Jesuit participated in two foreign service trips. The purpose of these trips is to develop a faith that acts and the core mission of the SJJ experience: being Men for Others. By traveling to foreign countries, the students are directly engaging tenets of the Grad at Grad. Participants exhibit their willingness to be Open to Growth, while simultaneously demonstrating their Commitment to Doing Justice.

In June 2017, sixteen rising seniors served the citizens of Zone 3, the impoverished garbage dump community of Guatemala City, Guatemala. Through International Samaritan, an organization founded by former SJJ president Fr. Don Vettese almost 30 years ago, SJJ students worked with the Francisco Coll School and aided in various projects for the school and community. In the evening, the team engaged in reflection to better address socioeconomic, cultural, and political issues around the world.


In July 2017, SJJ partnered with Marquette High from Milwaukee, also a Jesuit school, and 15 rising seniors served the community of Maria Auxiliadora in Paraguay with Courts for Kids.

The organization strives to immerse high school students in the developing world to build multipurpose courts. Although the courts can be used for a myriad of recreational activities, they also serve as safe, durable community centers. This trip involved intense physical labor during the day, and students stayed in homes with families in the evening to experience another culture at a deeper and more significant level.

In June 2018, SJJ will send 15 students to serve a community in Ciudad Sandino, Nicaragua, with International Samaritan. An additional 16 students will serve alongside the community with Courts for Kids in Tierra Firme, Colombia, in July 2018.



NATIONAL MERIT SEMIFINALISTS



St. John's Jesuit High School and Academy has three National Merit Semifinalists in the Annual National Merit Scholarship Program: Dylan M. Francis '18, Daniyal Nadeem '18, and Joey Veltri '18. These students competed for some 7,400 National Merit scholarships worth more than \$32 million. Approximately 90 percent of the semifinalists attained finalist standing, and about half of the finalists have recently been awarded a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar[®] title.

Dylan M. Francis '18

is a member of the National Honor Society and has been honored with the St. John Berchmans Award, the Alphonses Rodriguez Award, and the AP Scholar with Distinction Award. He is captain of the chess team and the Model United Nations team and is a member of the Creative Writing Club, fall play, and debate team. He has rowed for the crew team for seven seasons. Francis has participated in many service opportunities, including the Guatemala service trip, the Universal Health Aid screening service in northwest Ohio, Crossgates Preschool, Freedom School Maumee, Food for Thought, and Senior Independence Hospice. He has applied to the University of Chicago, Johns Hopkins University, Princeton University, Northwestern University, Case Western Reserve University, Yale University, New York University, and Reed College. He intends to study mathematics and physics.

On April 18, 2018, Francis won the Merit Scholarship award sponsored by the Owens Corning Foundation.

Daniyal Nadeem '18

is in National Honor Society and has received the AP Scholar with Honor Award and Class Honors during his four years of high school. He is the captain of the Science Olympiad team and is a member of the Debate Team and Model United Nations Team. Nadeem has competed on the tennis team for four years. He has undertaken service opportunities through Labre and the Christian Service program, through which he served at Crossgates Preschool. He has applied to Northwestern University, the University of Pennsylvania, Columbia University, The Ohio State University, and Case Western Reserve University. He intends to pursue a premedical track.

Joey Veltri '18

has been a member of the National Honor Society, Spanish National Honor Society, Ignatian Guild Scholars, and the Ambassador Society during his time at SJJ. He has received the Outstanding Freshman Award, the Outstanding Sophomore Award, the Rensselaer Medal for Math and Science, the AP Scholar with Distinction Award, and Class Honors every quarter. He has participated in various service opportunities, including volunteering at St. Clare Commons, assisting as an altar server at St. Rose Parish, and being a peer tutor. He has played for the chess team, as well as the JV tennis team, every year. He also has actively participated in SJJ's spring musical since sophomore year. Veltri has applied to Purdue University, The Ohio State University, the University of Notre Dame, Northwestern University, and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. He intends to double-major in mathematics and computer science.

National Commended Scholars

SJJ SENIOR EARNS QUESTBRIDGE SCHOLARSHIP



QuestBridge is a powerful platforrm that connects students who qualify with leading institutions of higher education. Misael Beltran-Guzman '18 recently earned the prestigious QuestBridge Scholarship.

During his junior year, Mary Ann Barabino, the Director of the 20/20 Program, encouraged him to apply for this scholarship, and, on Dec. 17, 2017, he learned that he had won.

Scholarship recipients are granted admission to one of QuestBridge's partner colleges with a full, fouryear scholarship worth more than \$200,000. The scholarship covers tuition and fees, room and board, books and supplies, and travel expenses. To apply, a student must have demonstrated high academic achievement.

Beltran-Guzman was matched with Colby College in Waterville, Maine, where he plans to study administration, as well as Spanish translation and interpretation.

Although he has always been involved in many activities at SJJ, senior year has been especially busy for Beltran-Guzman. He was elected student body vice-president and has served on the Homecoming and Prom committees, the Model United Nations team, the National Honor Society and the Spanish National Honor Society, and on the yearbook committee. He recently traveled to Washington, D.C., with the Social Justice Alliance for the March for Our Lives. His favorite experience at St. John's was the foreign service trip to Guatemala during his junior year.

With such a solid academic leadership foundation, Beltran-Guzman wil undoubtedly show Colby College just how successful an SJJ grad can be.

CHRISTOPHER KNIGHT '78 JOINS SJJ AS VP/COO



Christopher Knight assumed the position of Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of St. John's Jesuit

on April 16, 2018. Reporting directly to President Michael Savona '75, Knight's primary role will be leadership of the school vision and strategic planning. In this capacity, he will be responsible for overseeing the high school administrative leadership team, the academy leadership team, admissions, marketing, and technology.

Knight brings to SJJ a depth of experience and proven leadership in Catholic education that spans more than two decades. He also provides extensive experience as a Jesuit administrator. In 2004, he led the team that created St. John's Jesuit Academy and served as its first principal. Most recently, Knight served as secretary for catechetical formation and education, as well as superintendent of schools, for the Catholic Diocese of Cleveland. Prior to this position, he served as the senior director of Catholic education and superintendent of schools for the Catholic Diocese of Toledo.

Knight said, "St. John's Jesuit has been a major influence in my life since I first walked through its doors as a high school student. I am excited to have the opportunity to return to the SJJ community and contribute to the transformative work of providing a Jesuit education to young men throughout northwest Ohio. I look forward to being part of a vibrant community, immersed in Ignatian spirituality, where each student is inspired to reach his greatest potential."

A Toledo native and a product of Catholic primary and secondary schools, Knight earned his Bachelor of Business Administration degree from the University of Toledo. He also obtained a Master's Degree in Educational Administration from the University of Dayton.

Savona said, "I have admired Chris's leadership and vision for many years. His ability to work in collaboration with others is second to none."

THE SPIRITUAL RETREAT EXPERIENCE AT SJJ

Each year, students at every grade level go on retreat. Since the first Kairos in 1987, retreats have been a cornerstone of the St. John's Jesuit experience. As a Jesuit institution, SJJ is committed to Cura Personalis, or care of the whole person. Jesuit institutions worldwide promote the importance of brotherhood, as well as each individual's relationship with all of humanity. An exceptional way to reinforce this idea in students is through retreats. Each retreat builds on the previous year's retreat and culminates in Kairos for senior year. Kairos is a four-day, three-night time to step away to reflect on God in each student's life. Faculty leaders will quickly admit they have been blessed to share in moments of joy and challenge as the young men reflect on their own lives and further anticipate how their personal growth through a Kairos experience will be shared as they journey forward. One recent Kairos retreatant shared, "Kairos came at a much-needed time in my life. It opened my eyes to many new points of view on different aspects of my life. I am very grateful for the time that I was able to spend with my classmates and grow closer to God with them."

This year, the Pastoral Ministries Team helped prepare 15 student retreats, including the first football team retreat. Each retreat takes a month or two of planning and preparation. Leaders undertake the logistics of where and when each retreat will take place, frequent contact with the retreat houses, details that vary by retreat, assembly of student and adult teams for each retreat, transportation, food, and priests for Masses and reconciliation services. In addition, every team of students and adults meets multiple times to prepare. Much is given by way of time, treasure, and talents.

The retreat system at SJJ is truly a unique experience, a gift from God and St. Ignatius Loyola. As one student wrote,

"Kairos gave me a surreal feeling that cannot be explained with a thousand words. The entire experience positively impacted me and brought me closer to my Titan brothers and God."

SJJ BAND WINS BIG IN STATE COMPETITION





For the first time in the history of St. John's Jesuit, the Marching Titans earned straight superior ratings ("1s") to qualify for the Ohio Music Educators Association (OMEA) State Competition in November 2017. According to Director of Bands, Tim Martin, this band is to be commended for its hard work and dedication. Martin said, "Every year, the Marching Titans spend countless hours in rehearsal, practicing their competition show for OMEA marching band competitions. This past fall, the Marching Titans earned a 'superior' rating at the Maumee Music In Motion competition, which led the band to Brunswick, Ohio, to compete at the State Marching Band finals for the first time!"

Martin also directs SJJ's symphonic band, indoor drumline, indoor color guard, pep band, and other programs, such as wind ensembles and jazz combos. He notes that the goal of the band program is to "support and encourage musical and performing arts through hard work, personal responsibility, and joy."



THE SJJ ACADEMY ENRICHMENT PROGRAM TEACHES NEW SKILLS

St. John's Jesuit Academy was the first school in the Toledo area to offer an innovative setting for sixth, seventh, and eighth grade boys who would thrive within the mission to be more, do more, and be a *Man for Others*. In addition to outstanding academics, Academy students participate in daily enrichment classes. These courses are designed around student interests, with a goal of cultivating skillsets through hands-on activities that encourage young Titans to be open to growth. Each class has a goal-standard to work towards and achieve by the end of the semester and includes accomplishing one of "Three Important P's": producing a *product*, making a *presentation*, or giving a *performance*.

Currently, the enrichment courses being offered include health, athletics/fitness, cooking, band, robotics, design/build/fly, media, chorus, coding, art, yearbook, cooking and jewelry making, which is one of the most popular choices. Eighth grader Ricard Amezquita-Cadavid said, "Every single present I have given has been from that class. I made my mom earrings and others bracelets." The mix of offerings is designed to appeal to most boys. Seventh grader Zane Ziemke added, "Cooking is my favorite class because you get to make food and eat it and learn how to cook so you don't starve in college."

The Enrichment Program was developed when the Academy opened so boys could step out of their comfort zones to try new activities during the school week. Each student can try two activities per semester. These activities provide a way to channel his energy in a positive way while exploring new skills.

SJJ ROBOTICS CLUB Competes for Big Prizes

The SJJ Robotics Club competed in First Tech Challenge (FTC) Tournaments, hosted by the For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology (FIRST) program.

The JV team, composed of all first-year club members, placed seventh out of 28 teams in the Van Wert tournament. The veteran team, the Broken Axles, qualified for the State FTC Robotics competition, its second state tournament appearance in a row. It also won the Promote Award for creating a 30-second video about FTC and came in second for the Compass Award, which recognizes the efforts of the team's faculty mentor, Mr. Andy Smith '99.

The competition challenges students to design, build, program, and operate robots to compete in a head-to-head challenge in an alliance format.

Participants call it "the hardest fun you'll ever have!"

Guided by adult coaches and mentors, students develop STEM skills and practice engineering principles (like keeping an engineering notebook), while realizing the value of hard work, innovation, and sharing ideas. The robot kit is reusable from year-to-year and can be programmed using a variety of languages, including Java. Teams also must raise funds, design and market their team brand, and do community outreach, for which they can win awards. Participants have access to tens of millions of dollars in college scholarships.





TITANS WIN ON ED HEINTSCHEL COURT DEDICATION NIGHT



December 1, 2017, will always be a night to remember as the St. John's Jesuit Titans basketball players defeated the Rogers Rams 89-52 on the evening that school officials dedicated the Ed Heintschel Court in the Titan Dome. Past and present Titans came together to celebrate the newly renovated Ed Heintschel Court with festivities that included both pre- and post-game receptions and a dedication video.



On the college front, Jones is thriving. "I am currently redshirting in baseball to give myself a year to develop my game and grow physically. In the classroom, I am majoring in biology and striving every day to obtain my degree," he said.

The kids at Jones' hometown Boys and Girls Club have much to admire in this young alum both in the classroom and as a representative of what it means to be a *Man for Others*.


CLASS NOTES
