FR. TOM PIPP, SJ, RETURNS TO ST. JOHN'S JESUIT



Fr. Pipp has returned to work with Director of Christian Service Julie Santiago and Director of Campus Ministry Richard Maume in the Office of Pastoral Ministries.

A familiar face is once again leading the Office of Pastoral Ministries. Fr. Tom Pipp, SJ, assumed the role of Vice President of Jesuit Identity in August. He succeeds Fr. James Sand, SJ, who left Toledo to begin his Tertiationship, the final period of formal training for a Jesuit priest.

Pipp is no stranger to the St. John's Jesuit community. His connection to SJJ spans decades, having served previously as a theology teacher during his regency and later as Director of Service and Vice President for Mission. A familiar and respected spiritual presence on campus, Pipp recently presided over the funeral Mass for beloved faculty member Ron Miller and is leading the formation of new faculty and staff..

"We're thrilled to welcome Fr. Tom back home to St. John's," President Karl Ertle said. "His deep understanding of Ignatian spirituality and his long-standing relationship with our community make him uniquely suited to guide and strengthen our mission at this important time in our school's history."

Most recently, Pipp served as Superior of the Northeast Ohio Jesuit Community, residing at John Carroll University while directing the Ignatian Spirituality Institute and leading regional Jesuit initiatives.

Since August, Pipp has been actively involved with school leadership, adult formation, and faith development of the student body. As the completion of the first semester draws near, Pipp has re-engaged on many levels and said, "Returning to St. John's Jesuit as a 'new/old' person, I have been enjoying being back in a high school environment and learning. It's been a joy to reconnect with old friends and alumni, and to serve in an institution solid in its Catholic, Jesuit identity. But after an absence of 16 years, I also realize that much has changed. I am learning the names of many new faculty and staff members, as well as becoming acclimated to the technology. For me, these weeks have been blessed in a very welcoming place."

BOLD BUSINESS MINDS

ENTREPRENEURS LEAD WITH JESUIT PRINCIPLES

A Jesuit education puts emphasis on critical thinking. Students are challenged to expand their minds, question, analyze, and act. So the fact that St. John's Jesuit alumni often become entrepreneurs—creative thinkers who look for and take undiscovered paths in their careers—should come as no surprise.

Three creative thinkers who graduated in the 2000s are making great strides in their careers by looking at problems in a new way or courageously forging roads that previously did not exist—and building companies for the new products and services that come from these brilliant ideas. And these new companies have Jesuit ideals at the core of their missions.

SAM ANDERSON '01-SA RAIL



Sam Anderson is part of a Titan family that goes back decades and spans fathers, sons, uncles, cousins, and grandsons. He's also part of the Andersons, Inc. legacy, a nearly 80-year-old Toledo-based institution in the agribusiness and renewables sectors. The company's mission statement echoes the

Jesuit ideals—"our company is a powerful vehicle through which we channel our time, talent, and energy in pursuit of the fundamental goal of serving God by serving others"—so it's no wonder Anderson could rely on his strong family and educational foundations to help propel his career success.


After graduation from SJJ, Anderson spent a year working in a railcar repair shop operated by The Andersons, Inc.; he then earned a bachelor's degree from The Ohio State University and an MBA from University of Utah. He returned to The Andersons, Inc., to help the company grow its business in the North American rail sector. "When I started, we had one railcar repair shop in Maumee [Ohio] and 3,000 railcars. After 20 years, we had opened 30 repair shops across the United States, and we owned 25,000 railcars. I was fortunate to be surrounded by people who taught me how to attack the rail business so early in my career."

But even in a family business, careers aren't always predictable. Not wanting to rest on his name and previous success, Anderson took the path to create his own company in the niche vacated by The Andersons, Inc., when the company sold its railcar business. "I saw a unique opportunity in the market and created SA Rail."

Building his company wasn't always easy, but **Anderson kept his Jesuit roots and family heritage top of mind as he worked through the early days.** "I believe that if you are pushing yourself and those around you to build something, you will face adversity, and you must have the strength to get through it. I feel fortunate to have faced adversity at a young age while at SJJ—whether it was a teacher telling me my work was insufficient (which happened frequently) or a coach barking at me to improve (which happened even more frequently). SJJ set a tone early in my life for dealing with adversity partly because SJJ made things 'tough' and partly because SJJ gave me the perspective from a very young age that no matter how bad I thought things were, there was almost certainly someone in the world going through something much worse."

He pushed through the adversity to create a thriving company. These days, SA Rail has a presence in 17 states and a strong team of dedicated employees. Anderson's excitement with his company is evident: "It makes me proud when we are able to give back to the community and when current customers want to grow their business with us because I believe that displays a high level of trust in what is still a very young company."

While much of Anderson's day is spent looking toward the future as he expands SA Rail, he also looks back fondly at his time at SJJ. "Acting as a *Man for Others* and **knowing the importance of service** are powerful themes from my high school years. These concepts have been foundational for me when it comes to maintaining faith, raising a family, and building a business." He includes Tim Malone '69, former teacher and principal, and Ed Heintschel, former teacher and basketball coach, as influential to his development. "I always saw Tim as someone who led SJJ by example and



invariably knew the perfect thing to say to me when things weren't going well. He was never forced, always genuine. Ed was my coach, and virtually every experience in the basketball program made me stronger, and for that I am grateful."

With a keen eye on a business niche, an education to back up a business plan, and a Jesuit foundation to support his team, Anderson's entrepreneurial spirit has clearly proven to be a success.

SEAN WHEELOCK '13-INNER PEAK



People often place “math majors” in a category of number crunchers with dry and boring careers. But some logical and orderly thinkers—such as Sean Wheelock '13—prove to be analytical geniuses who also have vision, creativity, and, most important, a caring heart for others.

Wheelock, the valedictorian of his SJJ class, was an Applied Mathematics major at Harvard University. He never planned to be an entrepreneur; in fact, the beginning of his career was focused on leadership, advancement, and prestigious degrees. “I originally thought I wanted to become a leader in corporate America. After four years at a prestigious management consulting firm in New York City that was supposed to fast-track my career to the top of the corporate ladder, I realized that having a positive impact on the world was more important to me than obtaining a senior title at a big firm. I attribute this desire to ‘change the world’ to St. John’s focus on being a *Man for Others*.”

“I was looking for purpose in my work, and I didn’t feel right in a career that I didn’t see as helping solve a major problem facing the world at scale. One of the lessons from SJJ that I carried with me throughout my life was the idea of the *Magis*—or The More. I have always challenged myself to ask what more I could do for others or the world around me. What could I be doing to have a greater impact? How could I challenge myself to be a better partner, friend, and businessperson?

“That was when I decided I wanted to be an entrepreneur. I had always been interested in human psychology and decision-making, but it was my own personal journey struggling with anxiety and depression while at Harvard that inspired me to want to build a tool to help students build the resilience and coping skills to be able to handle the challenges the modern world presents.”

Needing to know more about startups, Wheelock left his job at Bain and Company, a global consulting firm, to earn an MBA from Stanford University and get deeper into the entrepreneurial world, specifically related to the mental health sector.

“Part of the reason I attended St. John’s Jesuit Academy for 7th grade was because I was a couple years ahead in math, and I could take high school math classes while in the Academy. I have fond memories of taking math with honors freshmen as a 7th grader.”

At SJJ, Wheelock participated in Christian service and campus ministry. He also started a March Madness bracket competition with his fellow Titans that raised more than \$10,000 to support clean water development in Honduras. He was the senior class president and a member of the golf and debate teams.

Wheelock and his co-founder, Ben Anandappa, felt it was important that the tool they would create would be **affordable and accessible**, which is the reason they built it as a web and mobile platform. "We want everyone to be able to afford high quality mental health support. We also wanted to meet today's youth where they are—on their devices—to reduce the friction of getting help as much as possible."

Today, Wheelock's company and app—Inner Peak—is making great strides in student mental health, including success at schools like SJJ and Notre Dame Academy in Toledo.

"The moments that make me most proud are hearing from students and teachers who use the app and find it helpful in their moments of need. We also track how students report feeling after they engage with the Inner Peak app, and 70 percent report feeling better after using it. We want Inner Peak to be the

way that all schools across the U.S. support student mental health, triaging student support needs and helping students build and maintain their mental well-being."

He added, "Our top priority as a company is having a positive impact on the world. Our north star is what is best for our student users, not what will make us the most money (though we are a for-profit business, as we believe this stance will allow us to have the greatest impact). We are thoughtful and cautious about potential implications of the technology we are using, so we have robust guardrails and safety measures in place."


With a clear focus on being a *Man for Others*, Wheelock and InnerPeak are changing lives through creative ideas aimed at students' well-being and positive mental health.

MICHAEL EDDINGFIELD '13-OPENSUPPLY



Michael Eddingfield '13 might be the rare entrepreneur who knew from a young age that he wanted to have a career rooted in creativity. "I always felt attracted to the creative side of things and have always been the person with fresh and frequent ideas. Whether it was

school, artwork, or something else—I was always actively thinking of new ideas. I felt one day, one of them would stick." He has also been an avid reader of biographies of entrepreneurs, which he now believes further fueled his entrepreneurial passion.

He backed his creative idea-generation skills with a solid degree in business from The Ohio State University, which led him to his first career in the warehousing division of DHL. And although that sector may not sound especially creative to the outside world, he spent seven years there learning from industry pros, absorbing many aspects of business that would later serve him well, and looking for a potential idea that might allow him to eventually strike out on his own as a business owner.

"I always knew I wanted to start my own company, but finding the right time to do it is tough. I knew I needed strong knowledge of an industry so that I could find areas for improvements to ultimately generate the business idea, a network to be able to succeed from a sales perspective, and the confidence that I could do it on my own. For me, that recipe landed about seven years after I graduated from college."

"Today, our website, OpenSupplyCo.com, helps large manufacturers and companies find warehouses in the U.S. Think Zillow, but for warehousing. OpenSupply not only helps companies find warehouses that are a match, but also helps the warehousing companies by bringing them customers, which we consider a win-win," he said.



Eddingfield added that his team wanted to provide other services to the users of OpenSupply, so they also founded The Optum Group, which designs, engineers, and installs pallet racking that stores products—a major differentiator for the company.

At both OpenSupply and The Optum Group, Eddingfield incorporates lessons he learned from his time at SJJ. **"Bringing enthusiasm to my work, building camaraderie with the people I meet, and continuing to help people—being a *Man for Others*—has brought me fulfillment in what I do,"** he said. He cites staff members Steve Spenthoff and Doug Pearson for their guidance in the classroom and in life. "Mr. Spenthoff was and is passionate about the mission of St John's Jesuit and about creating *Men for Others*. He also understood that building camaraderie and working together as a group not only made us more powerful, but also made our experiences a whole lot more fun. Coach Pearson was instrumental in setting high expectations in the way a person is supposed to act on and off the football field. I believe he set so many of my fellow teammates on a trajectory that helped lead them to success later in life."

Eddingfield's lifelong creativity—along with his focus on maintaining an emphasis on being a *Man for Others*—will help keep his companies on the track to success as his young career grows.

SJJ HALL OF FAME

THE ST. JOHN'S JESUIT HALL OF FAME INDUCTS CLASS OF 2025

The St. John's Jesuit Hall of Fame committee identified six individuals and one team to be inducted as the Class of 2025. The ceremony, held on October 3, 2025, celebrated ideal examples of academic excellence, altruistic spirit, and athletic achievement.

JUSTIN DALER '89



As a student, Justin Daler excelled in track and field as a pole vaulter, achieving a remarkable milestone by competing in the 1992 U.S. Olympic Track and Field trials.

Daler earned a Bachelor of Science degree at the University of Tennessee

before returning to Ohio to attend the University of Toledo College of Law, where he received his Juris Doctorate.

Daler has dedicated his legal career to public service as an attorney and public defender. He currently serves as the Chief Public Defender for Wood County, where he advocates for those in need of legal representation. His commitment to justice and his community reflects the values instilled during his Jesuit education.

JAKE EPPERSON '08

Jake Epperson is a surgeon in the Chicago metropolitan area. As a student at SJJ, he earned two state championships in swimming—one in the 100-yard breaststroke and one in the 200-yard individual medley. Throughout his high school career, he established seven school swimming records and received three Most Valuable Player awards.

Epperson's senior year at SJJ marked a historic season for the Titan swimming program. The team achieved remarkable success, highlighted by a significant upset victory over St. Francis de Sales High School in the District Championships—ending the Knights'

unprecedented 43-year winning streak in that competition. Epperson's athletic legacy at SJJ remains firmly established, as he continues to hold six school records.

Currently completing his surgical residency, Epperson continues to demonstrate the dedication and excellence that characterized his academic and athletic achievements at St. John's Jesuit.

JAMES EYSTER '70

James Eyster was actively involved in cross country, *The Cavalier*, yearbook, theater, Quiz Bowl, and the Junior Council on World Affairs while at SJJ. He fondly remembers Fr. Sweeney as his favorite teacher.



Eyster earned his undergraduate degree at Princeton University and his Juris Doctorate from Fordham Law School, where he founded and served as editor-in-chief of the *Fordham International Law Journal*. He built a distinguished legal career as a partner at Lovell, Stewart, Halebian, and Jacobson, specializing in immigration and refugee rights.

Throughout his career, Eyster has demonstrated extraordinary commitment to public service and social justice. His extensive community involvement includes serving as president of the Chelsea School District Board of Education, co-chair of the Michigan Coalition for Immigrant and Refugee Rights, and national coordinator of the Immigrant Children Lawyers Network. He has held academic positions at Thomas M. Cooley Law School, Ave Maria School of Law, and Peking University School of Transnational Law. His advocacy work extends to serving as an advisor to the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and participating in United Nations forums on human dignity.

Beyond his legal career, Eyster is a talented musician and creative artist. He has received two Michigan Council for the Arts Creative Artists grants. His musical talents earned him second place at the 1996 Midwest Folk Harp competition, and he has been profiled in *International Who's Who in Music* and *Who's Who in America*.

His multifaceted life seamlessly blends legal advocacy, academic excellence, artistic expression, and community leadership, embodying the Jesuit ideals of service to others and the pursuit of justice.

TOM HARMS, FORMER FACULTY




Ironically, Tom Harms was expelled from St. John's Jesuit and graduated from Bowsher High School in 1970. He went on to earn a bachelor's degree in English from the University of Toledo and a master's degree in American Literature from Miami University.

Harms dedicated his career to education as an English teacher at SJJ, where he served with distinction for decades. His leadership roles included English Department Chair for eight years, Campus Ministry Director for eight years, and Integrity Committee Director for 10 years. He also served as a devoted moderator for various student activities: *The Cavalier* for 10 years, *The Promethean* for 12 years, and cheerleading for three years. His favorite teacher during his own education was Fr. Bader Cassin, SJ, who taught him English in ninth grade.

EDWARD HOBBS '81

Edward Hobbs has dedicated his career to serving his country through military service and government work. He distinguished himself as the drum major of the SJJ band; he also played freshman football and participated in the Astronomy Club during his years on Airport Highway.



Hobbs earned a bachelor's degree in Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering from The Ohio State University in 1985, launching a distinguished 23-year career as a United States Naval Flight Officer. He later enhanced his military education with a master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the United States Naval War College in 2004, achieving the rank of Commander.

Following his retirement, Hobbs continued serving the US Navy for 10 years as an Operations Research Analyst, bringing his total government service to more than three decades.

Hobbs' commitment to service extends to community involvement, including the Knights of Columbus, multiple church ministry roles, and food pantry volunteer roles. His dedication to education continues through his work as a tutor and mentor to elementary school students in grades 3-5.

In a testament to his ongoing connection to his alma mater, Hobbs served as a Senior Project Presenter following the COVID-19 pandemic, sharing his expertise with the next generation.

TIM MATHENEY '85

Tim Matheney has built a distinguished career in educational leadership spanning more than three decades. As a high school student, he excelled as editor-in-chief of *The Cavalier*, served as Executive Council Treasurer during his senior year, was named Salutatorian, and was a member of the National Honor Society.



Matheney earned his undergraduate degree in history from Princeton University in 1989. He also earned a Master of Arts in Educational Administration and Policy from the University of Michigan in 1997.

Matheney's career began at SJJ, where he served as a Social Studies teacher from 1989-1993 and as Alumni/Annual Fund Director from 1993-1995. During this time, he also advised the yearbook and led student retreats.

Matheney served as principal of South Brunswick High School in New Jersey, where the school earned recognition as a National School of Character and *U.S. News'* Best High School. He later held roles as Chief Intervention Officer for New Jersey Department of Education, Founding Executive Director of Philadelphia Academy of School Leaders, and Superintendent for South Portland, Maine.

1998-1999 STATE CHAMPIONSHIP HOCKEY TEAM

In St. John's Jesuit's storied athletic history, only a select few teams have earned the title of state champion. During the winter of 1998-99, the St. John's Jesuit hockey team transformed this aspiration into reality by claiming the Ohio High School Athletic Association State championship, though the title was stripped just two weeks later because of a technicality.

The foundation of the Titans' achievements rested on the leadership provided by eight seniors who formed the core of this championship squad. Co-captains Ben Assenmacher and Scott McKone paced the team offensively. The forward corps featured significant contributions from seniors Brad Schuller, Mike Zak, and Ryan Zdanowicz, each bringing relentless effort and passion to every shift. On defense, Brian Hartman anchored the blue line alongside the formidable duo of J.P. Henson and Brody Richter—dubbed the “Bash Brothers”—who excelled at reading the play and maintaining offensive pressure.

Matheney has served as a member of the Folk Arts-Cultural Treasures Charter School board. He has also contributed to educational discourse through his writing. In 2018, he published *Leadership that Lasts: Seven Actions toward an Enduring Impact*, a book that draws upon his SJJ experience, exploring concepts like *Magis* and reflecting on the joy of leading Kairos retreats.

Among the season's standout achievements was a perfect 3-0 record against St. Francis de Sales High School, along with tournament victories at the Tam O'Shanter Holiday Tournament, the St. John's Invitational, and the Bowling Green/Huntington Bank tournament. The latter featured a memorable triumph over the team's longtime rivals, the Bowling Green High School Bobcats.

The Titans dominated the district playoffs, dispatching teams from Worthington, Findlay, and Centerville to earn a place in the state Final Four. Despite treacherous winter conditions, hundreds of devoted SJJ fans braved a severe snowstorm to witness the team capture the state championship trophy. However, the celebration was short-lived when the SJJ community received shocking news just one week later: a player had been declared ineligible because he had participated in a club hockey game during the regular season. While the Titans were forced to relinquish the trophy, their exceptional performance ultimately earned them a fifth-place national ranking.



IGKNIGHT THE ACADEMY

Twenty years of Jesuit education in grades 6, 7, and 8, were celebrated at the first home game of the Titan football season! Many Academy graduates and former faculty returned to celebrate Mass, presided by former faculty member Fr. Lukas Laniauskas, SJ. At halftime, the school recognized the IgKnight the Academy Fund, a program designed to continue the unique learning

environment and student care established by founding/former principal and current administrative coordinator Chris '78 and Brenda Knight.

A COACHING LEGACY


Ed Heintschel left a lasting mark in the history of high school basketball at St. John's Jesuit. Heintschel amassed a 725-224 record and a .764 winning percentage during his 40 seasons with the Titans. Under his helm, the Titans reached three state championship games and six Final Four games; the team also won 16 district championships and 17 league championships (City League and Three Rivers Athletic Conference).

But more than a passion for winning, Heintschel instilled in his players a love for teamwork. "Accountability, self-discipline, and the concept of working together is the baseline," he said. Undoubtedly these foundations are transferable skills, as many Titan basketball players have gone on to become leaders. In fact, many have gone on to become coaches and instill these same foundations in players around the state and the country.

Northwest Ohio currently boasts five head basketball coaches who graduated from SJJ and played for Heintschel. Through these stand-out coaches, the legacy of Titan basketball excellence is passed on: Mike Floyd '06 (Central Catholic); Terron "TJ" Gillespie '10 (Maumee High School); Benjamin "BJ" Raymond '05 (Start High School); Mike Schoen '05 (St. John's Jesuit); and Raymond "Shaun" Scott '07 (Cardinal Stritch).

True to who he was as a coach for decades, Heintchel still finds joy in watching his former players instill the life lessons of basketball into young players today and said, "I'm really proud of these guys. They are good leaders of young men. That's what it is all about."

MIKE FLOYD '06, HEAD COACH FOR CENTRAL CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL





Head coach for Central Catholic High School Mike Floyd '06 spent most of his young life striving to be a Titan basketball player. "From being a ball boy for the 1996 State Runner-Up team to playing in a state championship game myself, I was able to learn not only a ton about the game of basketball and how to be a part of a successful team, but also many life lessons that have stayed with me until this day. It was a privilege to put on that SJJ basketball jersey. I will never forget being told, as a freshman, that I was dressing varsity and putting that jersey on for the first time—especially because of the amount of respect I had in knowing the history of the program and the people who came before me."

RAYMOND “SHAUN” SCOTT ’07, HEAD COACH FOR CARDINAL STRITCH HIGH SCHOOL

Head coach for Cardinal Stritch Raymond “Shaun” Scott ’07 said his approach to coaching is also reminiscent of his time as a Titan. “My high school basketball experience was very positive and shaped the way I coach today. It built my sense of discipline, teamwork, and character. Coach Heintschel expected greatness out of all of us, whether you were a star player or not. Not being a star player myself, but having that standard instilled in me, is key to the way I coach today.”



MIKE SCHOEN ’05, HEAD COACH FOR ST. JOHN’S JESUIT HIGH SCHOOL



Titan head coach Mike Schoen ’05 hardly remembers having another basketball coach, as Heintschel was his coach in grade school and high school. He then coached under Heintschel from 2009-2019 until he took the position as head coach when Heintschel retired. “I was always amazed at Ed’s ability to get the most out of his players, push the right buttons, and coach each player differently,” Schoen said.

Schoen faces all kinds of basketball coaches, but when he sees a Titan alumnus across the court, he feels a different kind of a connection to the game, as well as a brotherhood. He said, “What I know about an opponent coached by a fellow Titan is that he will produce a well-coached team that knows how to win. The team will be tough to beat because of its solid foundation. The players will know what it takes to win.”

EIGNER BRINGS JESUIT PRINCIPLES TO PRO HOCKEY

Peter Eigner ’20 might have been born with a hockey stick in his hand. A Minnesotan who grew up in ice arenas as the son of a hockey coach, Eigner played travel hockey before joining the Titans as a goalie and forward during his high school years. He also earned a spot on the Bowling Green State University team as a reserve goalie who saw gametime during his tenure, keeping his favorite sport at the forefront of his college experience. After college, he continues to keep his hockey dreams alive by working as a scout for the NHL’s Washington Capitals.



Titan Topics: How did you get started in scouting as a career? Is that a path you had always wanted to pursue?

Eigner: For a while, I had thought about coaching as a career, but for the past few years I realized I would probably enjoy scouting more, so as soon as I finished playing in March 2025, I started reaching out to professional teams. I signed with Washington in September 2025.

TT: What are your duties as a scout? Where and how often do you travel?

Eigner: As a first-year scout, I look for and find the best NCAA free agents in the Midwest. Because most of the best prospects in college hockey have been drafted by other teams, we can’t just sign anyone, so my job is to look for undrafted players we think are good enough to play for us. My region is any college team within three or four hours of Washington, D.C., so each weekend I’ll drive to different schools to watch two or three games and make reports on the players. Later in the year, we will start recruiting the players we are interested in.

TT: Where would you like this job to lead...to coaching, to management?

Eigner: My goal is to be a general manager, so I plan to stay in hockey for the rest of my career. Washington’s general manager started his career as a scout, which is cool for me because I can pick his brain and learn how he advanced his way to his current position.

TT: How do you incorporate Jesuit principals into your career?

Eigner: SJJ has shaped a number of areas of my life, including the way I go about my daily interactions. I am honest with the players and agents I deal with, and I maintain good relationships. I also look for players who share the same principles, because character is something we really weigh heavily in our assessment of players. Playing ability is obviously needed to make it in professional sports, but having good character is a non-negotiable for us when evaluating players.

TITANS NAME NEW HEAD COACHES

VARSITY HOCKEY



In July, Director of Athletics Bob Ronai named Jason Szynkowski Head Hockey Coach of the Titans.

“Jason has an extensive hockey background, both as a player and a coach,” Ronai said. “He not only brings a passion, enthusiasm, and deep understanding of the game, but he also has a love for St. John’s.”

Szynkowski has been a math teacher at St. John’s Jesuit for 15 years. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree in Middle Childhood Education from Miami University and played both varsity and club hockey at the university. During his time at Miami, the Red Hawks won the Club National Championship (2000), and he was named an All-American Defenseman twice and team captain four times.

Szynkowski began his coaching career at Miami as a player/coach for the Red Hawks before taking over as the Club Hockey Head Coach from 2001–2003. During his

time at the helm, the team reached the ACHA National Tournament in 2002 and 2003 and was a national semifinalist in 2002.

“I am humbled and excited to be given this opportunity to lead the program. I am committed to excellence, and we are going to do this the right way: with devotion, character, and hard work. This position is a labor of love, a vocation. Our goal is to develop and grow young men of substance. The winning then takes care of itself,” Szynkowski said.

From 2003-2014, Szynkowski was an assistant on the Titans’ varsity staff. The Titans reached the Final Four in 2007 and 2008, winning the state championship in ’07.

Additionally, Szynkowski’s experience extends to summer hockey schools, where he facilitates Defensemen Specialty Camps and Checking/Scoring Specialty Camps as both coach and director.

“I am honored to have people inside and outside the hockey community trust and believe in me. SJJ has tremendous history and tradition. It’s not a jersey that gets handed to anybody; you have to earn it.”

VARSITY ROWING



On June 3, Director of Athletics Bob Ronai introduced Will Bridges as the Head Rowing Coach. Bridges comes to Toledo from the Olentangy Rowing Club, where he was named the head coach in 2023.

“I am incredibly excited to coach and lead the SJJ crew team! The water and the boathouse are fantastic and provide a great foundation for success,” Bridges said.

From 2018–22, Bridges was a member of The Ohio State University crew team.

Bridges began his career as an assistant coach with Olentangy in 2022 before taking over as head coach in 2023. Under his watch, the team grew from 40 to 60+ members, and the men’s team increased from 12 to 30+ members.

Ronai said, “Bridges brings an incredible amount of knowledge and expertise to St. John’s. We are fortunate to have him continue the long-standing, strong tradition of rowing at St. John’s.”

A FULL CIRCLE MOMENT FOR TITAN ATHLETICS

Tom Cole is a longtime supporter of St. John's Jesuit and the thousands of students who have walked the halls since he was a member of the first graduating class in 1969. Cole played football for the Titans and went on to play for Ohio Wesleyan University. He returned to SJJ as a teacher and coach for more than two decades, serving as offensive coordinator for Coach Fred Beier from 1981-2004. After SJJ, Cole went on to a successful local sports broadcasting career at BCSN. He now works in community relations for Taylor Automotive Group.



“ It was the end of the 1985 SJJ football season and a must-win game for the Titans—a Blue Division Championship against Bowsher High School and a chance to play in the Shoe Bowl [an annual high school football event played at the University of Toledo stadium].

Rob Chudzinski '86, a six-foot, four-inch, 210-pound tight end with the hands of a surgeon, never dropped a pass. He could catch ping pong balls in a completely dark room with one arm behind his back. And that is exactly what he did against Bowsher that day. Chud caught six passes for 135 yards and three touchdowns. On the last catch, the Bowsher defenders interfered with him, pinning his arm behind his back. But Chud just caught the ball one-handed and fell into the end zone for a Blue Division championship for the Titans.

Rob Chudzinski had learned from four years of his Jesuit education to be tough, disciplined, open-minded, and confident. The Jesuits were always about potential and development of your skill set.

During that season, the legendary head coach of the University of Miami Hurricanes, Jimmy Johnson, was watching films of a Bowsher wide receiver from the SJJ game. He kept seeing SJJ number 84 making impossible catches and asked, ‘Who is that guy?’ Not long afterward,

Johnson invited Chud to visit and extended him his one and only offer for a full ride.

When Chud started out at Miami, he was twelfth on the depth chart at tight end. But true to his Jesuit education, he understood openness to change and courage to accept a challenge. He soon became the starting tight end and was on two national championship teams.

Chudzinski went on to have a successful career as a college coach and an NFL sidelines coach. He is now an offensive coach for Boston College, a Jesuit university where his son Kaelan, plays football and continues the family's Jesuit educational tradition. **”**

The golf team won the District Championship at Shawnee Country Club. The Titans shot 309, finishing six shots ahead of second place.



NEW FACILITIES FOR THE OLD BALL GAME

When the snow melts in March, just in time for spring baseball, the Titans will have a new field with a new name.

James M. Croak Family Park, named in honor of Dr. James Croak, is the vision of the entire Croak family. As the patriarch of the family and a standout pitcher for Clay High School's Varsity baseball team in 1961, Croak was a lifelong Detroit Tigers fan who loved playing catch with his son and grandsons. After his death in 2023, the family wanted to find a way to pay tribute to his memory. With strong ties to SJJ through son Dr. Andrew Croak '88, great-nephew Eric Croak '10 and grandsons Rowan Croak '24 and Grady Croak '27, a current member of the baseball team, the family proposed the idea for a facilities upgrade in 2024.

"Our family hopes the new baseball facilities and ongoing campaign will provide Titan athletes, their

families, and the team's fans with an environment where they will feel the community's support in both their athletic and academic endeavors," Dr. Croak said. "We believe in a strong Jesuit education, and we hope to inspire others to contribute to SJJ's mission of preparing young men from all backgrounds to be *Men for Others* through initiative, teamwork, and leadership."

Athletic Director Bob Ronai worked with the Croak family to align their vision with the needs of the Titan baseball program. "The upgrades will create a more positive experience for players, coaches, and spectators alike, leading to increased participation and competitive success. They will also significantly enhance the program's overall performance by providing a safer playing environment, boosting player morale, and attracting more student-athletes. Once completed, SJJ will have one of the premier baseball facilities in northwest Ohio," he said.

- Improved field drainage



THE BEAT GOES ON



If our dad thought so much of SJJ educating his two sons, maybe we needed to reconnect with the school. As the years passed, we got involved with the Alumni Department, particularly as my 45-year reunion was approaching. During the planning of the reunion, we met the Alumni Director. We inquired about Dad's policy.

We asked the typical questions: How much did SJJ receive? How was it being invested? Who was benefitting from the policy? The Alumni Director filled us in on the details, then asked me if I wanted to have a private lunch with one of the students who was receiving financial aid. A few weeks later, we met with one of the students...wow!!! The young man was a senior, very nervous, and not quite sure why we were meeting. We told him about my dad and discussed our family connection to SJJ. Then, he told me his story. He was from an inner-city family, an only child, with a single mom trying to get her son the best education possible. After graduation, he was headed to Michigan State University to major in engineering.

We were sold—our family needed to get involved at a higher level in the Legacy Society. So, purchased a larger life insurance policy to work when the time comes, in conjunction with Dad's policy."

The St. John Berchmans Legacy Society is the giving society that recognizes those who leave a gift to benefit SJJ after death. The purpose of the newly formed Planned Giving Council is to advise, educate, and champion the power of legacy giving, fostering collaboration among professional advisors and actively connecting alumni donors with the mission of the SJJ St. John Berchmans Legacy Society.


Timothy Borden '85 was appointed as Port Director of the U.S. Customs and Border Protection in Columbus, Ohio.
